<u>Course Description</u>: The Facilities and Technology Committee encourages you to attend this hands-on course which is open to all instructors, teaching assistants and members who are interested in learning the operational procedures for all classroom technology equipment. Each participant is encouraged to volunteer to be the Tech Assistant for one or more classes. The Tech Assistant plays a very important role in the smooth functioning of the class. New ideas are welcome as we develop quick reference sheets and instruction manuals. We are working hard to assign a Teaching Assistant and Tech Assistant to each course.

Instructor Background: Jessica Justice is a Web Developer for the WVU Center on Aging. She graduated from West Virginia University with a bachelor's degree in Computer Science and a minor in English. As an undergraduate she worked for the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences as a Web Coordinator and then as a Systems Administrator for the Lane Department of Computer Science and Electrical Engineering. <u>Course description</u>: Zumba is a dynamic fitness system that is high energy and motivating. The Latin music with unique movements allows participants to literally dance away their worries. Based on interval training, it has the principle that a physical workout should be fun and easy to do. Zumba will improve cardio-vascular fitness, maximize caloric output, tone and sculpt the body; increase energy, and reduce stress.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Tom Lombardi is Professor Emeritus in the WVU College of Human Resources and Education. An author of over 80 publications, he has received many awards and honors during his 35 years teaching at WVU including a Fulbright Fellowship in 2000 to develop special education teacher training programs in Lisbon, Portugal. In his younger years he was a professional dancer. Since retirement from WVU, Dr. Lombardi has activated those skills and now teaches Silversneakers and Zumba Gold here in Monongalia County as well as in Cocoa Beach, Florida, during winter months.

<u>Class description</u>: This course is for beginning knitters and knitters who want to learn new stitches or brush up on their skills. Knitters who just want to hang out are also welcome. This class can be on-going as long as students wish to meet.

NOTE: Needles and yarns may be purchased from the instructor. Web sites will be given to students so they may download free patterns. Books will also be in the classroom for students to study. New knitters will knit a scarf using size 13 or 15 needles depending on the yarn selected. Other knitters may knit a baby blanket or begin a sweater.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Shari's expertise is in fiber arts: weaving, spinning, knitting, and hand painting yarns. She has a master's degree in Special Education and was a Special Education teacher for 33 years, but has knitted all her life. In 1990 Shari took a spinning class and continued studying under nationally known spinners. At the same time, she began studying weaving, also under nationally known weavers. Along the way she won many awards for her wearable art. When she could not find the colors she wanted, Shari taught herself to hand paint yarns using her mother's water colors as inspiration. She enjoys passing on this art form.

<u>Course description</u>: The course provides an opportunity to learn some basic French expressions to help a non-French-speaking visitor get around and will also increase knowledge of French traditions. Everyone will be encouraged to practice speaking and to participate in role-play situations. Suggestions for topics of discussion are welcome. Opportunities for a conversational group will be explored.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Kathie Labys majored in French at Penn State and studied at the University of Strasbourg. She has taught high school French in Virginia, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. With her husband Walt, she spends summers in the French Alps, so she has plenty of opportunity to practice her French and is eager to share her experiences.

<u>Course description</u>: Each class session will center on a particular work of art that will be briefly explained. Then discussion will be "directed" toward self-understanding based upon the dictum: "all understanding is self-understanding."

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Dr. Taft retired from WVU where he taught in the Humanities Program. Previously, he taught at Morgantown High School. Teaching people, i.e., helping them discover the relevance of art has been at the heart of his teaching for over thirty years. He studied at the University of London and often visited Ireland. There is little separation between his life and his teaching. Both are closely associated. Constable said: "Art is just another word for feeling." It is through feeling that Dr. Taft experienced his own life. He encourages experiencing life to one extent or the other (temperaments differ) in listeners.

12. Henry IV, Part 1 (second of a series)

Instructor: William French

Maximum enrollment: 55



<u>Course description</u>: *Henry IV, Part 1* follows *Richard II* in the series of Shakespeare's so-called "Second Tetralogy," the plays that explore the history of England's civil wars, the Wars of the Roses, during the 15th century. Where *Richard II* is formally a tragedy, *Henry IV, Part 1*, is a satire, a dark comedy that addresses political issues and motivations. It is also a showcase for at least two of Shakespeare's most marvelous characters: Prince Hal and the inimitable Jack Falstaff. We will explore the play scene by scene and enjoy an excellent video production. Please also read the announcement titled "The Shakespeare History Plays Series."

Textbook: A paperback copy of the play—either the Folger or Signet edition—will serve well.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Dr. French is a native West Virginian. He earned an A.B. from WVU in 1954, an M.A. from the University of Pittsburgh in 1959, and a Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh in 1967. Dr. French taught everything from Freshman Composition to doctoral-level seminars in Shakespeare and Renaissance English drama in the English Department at WVU from 1964 until 2004. Along with winning numerous teaching awards, he has published many articles and one book (*Maryat Lee's EcoTheater: A Theater for the Twenty-First Century*, WVU Press, 1995).

The Shakespeare History Plays Series

Henry IV, Part 1 can be appreciated on its own. But Shakespeare's history plays are best experienced as a series. OLLI has kindly agreed to offer the entire series of Shakespeare's history plays in historical sequence over the next two and one-half years, as follows:

Spring 2009: Henry IV, Part 1

Fall 2009: Henry IV, Part 2

Spring 2010: Henry V

Fall 2010: Henry VI, Parts 1 and 2

Spring 2011: Henry VI, Part 3 and Richard III

The plays cover the so-called "Wars of the Roses," a period of English (and European) history when society moved from the medieval, feudal age to the early modern world, a time of momentous societal, political, and cultural change. There are excellent film versions of these plays available, a treat for every course.

13. Learning Mah Jong

<u>Course description</u>: Learning the basics of Mah Jong, a Chinese game played with tiles and with rules similar to the card game Gin Rummy. Four players designated East, West, South, and North take turns picking up and discarding tiles, beginning with East. Each player's goal is to complete his or her hand of four sets of three and a pair, thereby declaring Mah Jong.

Instructor's background: Shirley Bellman has played Mah Jong for over 20 years.

14. Writing Poetry

<u>Course description</u>: Whether you've never written a line of poetry or have published some poems, this course offers the opportunity to write poems in class and, if you wish, receive feedback on them. Dr. Sailer will suggest ways to begin your poem, continue, and end it. If you want, you can share your poem with others in the class. If you want to write just for yourself without sharing, that's fine, too.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Susan Sailer taught in the English Department at WVU from 1989 until 2000. She received her M.F.A. at New England College, 2007. Susan taught a course in writing poetry last spring at OLLI. She has two academic books and a dozen articles published and also a dozen poems, including several in anthologies.

15. Let's Make a Book!

Instructor: Rae Jean Sielen

Tuesday, 10:00 am — 12:00 noon

Computer Lab

April 7, 14, 21 Maximum enrollment: 5

<u>Course description</u>: Using OLLI's computer lab, participants will use an on-line, interactive book layout and design program which allows users to integrate text, photographs and captions. This approach to "bookmaking" has been used for many kinds of non-commercial books, including family history, anniversary, travel, wedding, tribute, poetry collections, baby, personal history, and memorial tribute.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Rae Jean Sielen is President and co-founder of Populore Publishing Company, founded in 1995 and located in Westover. She received an A.B. in Linguistics from the University of California and an M.S. in Speech and Hearing Sciences from the University of Washington.

Content/Topics:

Session 1: Experiment with the program using photos and text supplied by the instructors. Begin planning your book (examples of completed books will be shared).

Sessions 2 & 3: Work on your book with help from the instructors.

Materials fee: None. However, participants may choose to have their book printed (in color or BW) and hard bound, with a three-week turnaround time at the end of the course or at a later date. Soft bound options are also possible.

<u>Please note</u>: Participants need to be very comfortable using the Internet and e-mail, moving data and image files, typing, accessing drives, using a mouse, and following instructions. Having an e-mail address is required (for logon purposes). <u>Attendance at first session required</u>. Attendance at subsequent sessions expected.

Pre-class preparation: Participants will need to bring the following to Session 1:

- (1) sample of an electronic file containing some completed text for two items (e.g., chapters, stories, poems);
- (2) printout of #1;
- (3) [optional] sample digital files (JPEGs, minimum resolution of 300 dpi) of photos;
- (4) printouts of #3 (if used);
- (5) [optional] up to five original photos you are willing to let the instructors take to scan and return the following week along with digital files of the photos;
- (6) a flash drive and/or a few blank CDs.

Homework: Necessary writing and file preparation so that class time can be spent on page layout, especially uploading and manipulating files and images.

16. Horton Foote: Theatre and Film

Course description: Horton Foote is not perhaps the first name that comes to mind as one of the most prolific and legendary of American playwrights. At 92 years young, his latest Broadway triumph, "Dividing the Estate," closed in New York this past January 30. Horton Foote's legend began with the screenplay for "To Kill a Mockingbird," based on the novel by Harper Lee, for which he won his first Oscar. Other films include "Tender Mercies" (Oscar) and "The Trip to Bountiful" (Oscar). Foote has written nearly 40 plays, many detailing the life and culture around his Southeast Texas roots. His work is especially vibrant for the ways he handles people aging in place and reacting to the minutia of daily life ... in much the same way that Anton Chekhov wrote about people getting through their lives with humor and some dignity.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Professor Held has been a WVU faculty member since 1980, specializing in design, directing, and the literature of the theatre. He teaches theatre history, world theatre and drama, and scenic design. He has also designed numerous shows for WV Public Theatre and for professional theaters in Seattle and Atlanta.

21. American Popular Song Since WWII

<u>Course description</u>: Before WWII, radio programs consisted primarily of swing music and popular songs written by Irving Berlin, George Gershwin, Cole Porter, etc. Eventually rock & roll and country western songs predominated on radio. But the earlier kind of song, now referred to as pop standard, has continued to be of significance, and has continued to develop. The last half of the 20th century has produced a large body of wonderful examples. These are the subjects of this course.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Dr. Horacek is Professor Emeritus of Music at the College of Creative Arts of WVU. He is on the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute Honor Roll for instructors, and this is the 29th course he has taught for OLLI.

22. Spaced out Felted Scarf II (former students will weave a scarf)

NOTE: Students will need to bring scissors, a tape measure or ruler, tapestry needle, 2 cardboard strips size 1" by 9", several paper bags or a roll of craft paper cut 12" wide, sport weight feltable wool in 2 contrasting colors (2 balls each for a total of 4, recommended: Brown Sheep Nature Spun sport weight). The instructor will also have kits for \$35.00

<u>Instructor's background</u>: ShariWilliam's expertise is fiber arts: weaving, spinning, knitting, and hand painting yarns. She has a master's degree in Special Education and was a Special Education teacher for 33 years, but has knitted all her life. In 1990 Shari took a spinning class and continued studying under nationally known spinners. At the same time, she began studying weaving also under nationally known weavers. Along the way she won many awards for her wearable art. When she could not find the colors she wanted, Shari began to teach herself to hand paint yarns using her mother's water colors as inspiration. She enjoys passing on this art form.

<u>Class description</u>: A brief overview of how the use of fragrant materials, and later fragrances, evolved from antiquity to today. This is NOT a class on cosmetics or the use of fragrances; this is a history class and men are very welcome.

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Born to a Swiss diplomat father, Sabine traveled the world as a child. Growing up, she suffered chronic sinus infections that prevented her from smelling. At 13 she underwent surgery and finally discovered her sense of smell. A passion for this new world was rapidly born. By 16, she had done her first internship at Givaudan, and by 21 she had graduated as valedictorian from the ISIPCA school inVersailles. After a couple of internships at IFF, she went on to work for Firmenich for 13 years, first in Geneva where she was trained, then in Princeton NJ where she worked mainly on body care projects and finally in New York City, where she developed fine fragrances. In 2004, she moved to Morgantown, WV, with her husband to start a family. She now consults for Firmenich, as a perfumer and a trainer, and raises her two young daughters.

April 16 Personal and Family History Writing Projects: An Overview

<u>Class description</u>: Many want to preserve personal and family stories but don't know where to start. This presentation will provide examples of how others have done it. The ways are as varied as the authors and compilers themselves. Topics will include: strategies for organizing content; the front and back matter in a book: what it is and how it can help, tips for photographs and other printed items; and printing/binding basics. Participants will be able to identify approaches suitable for their own goals, materials, audience, and budget. Numerous sample books will be available for review and discussion. Bring questions, works in progress, and ideas. (Topics related to commercial publishing ventures such as how to sell manuscripts, find agents, and negotiate contracts will not be covered.)

<u>Instructor's background</u>: Rae Jean Sielen is President and co-founder of Populore Publishing Company, founded in 1995 and located in Westover. She received an A.B. in Linguistics from the University of California and an M.S. in Speech and Hearing Sciences from the University of Washington.

April 23 Fighter Planes of the First World War

Its utility in war seemed obvious, but only after blunders and false leads did the nations of the war evolve successful war planes. 
