02. The WWII Invasion of Southern France

Monday, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. January 14 Classroom B Course description: Coming after the Normandy invasion, the invasion of southern France was given less attention in the media, but contributed substantially to the allied domination of the continent. We will examine the planning and execution of the operation.

Instructor's background: Leo Horacek, a former naval aviator and flight instructor is a Professor Emeritus of Music at WVU. He is on the OLLI at WVU Honor Roll. This is the 52nd course he has taught for OLLI.

03. More about Military Marches

Course description: This class is a continuation of the summer 2012 lecture. It is an examination of a new selection of the great military marches of the world – including those of some additional European countries. It is an exploration of the relation of musical style to military policy.

Instructor's background: Leo Horacek is Professor Emeritus of Music at WVU. Leo is on the OLLI at WVU Honor Roll for instructors. This is the 53rd course he has taught for OLLI.

04. Living Together

Course description: No, this course will not be about cohabitation outside of marriage. Instead the instructor will give you information about symbiotic relationships in nature. A symbiotic relationship always involves at least two different types of organisms that live in close association with each other. When the two species both benefit from the relationship, the symbiosis is called a mutualism. Parasitism and commensalism are two other common types of symbiosis. There are fascinating symbioses occurring all around us and within us!

Instructor's background: Elizabeth Thomas is a Senior Lecturer in the Biology Department of WVU.

Instructor's background: Suzanne Reynolds has immersed herself in the study of Viniyoga, an approach that adapts the practice of yoga to meet the unique condition, needs, and interests of the individual. She is excited to share what she has learned with others.



06. Weight of the Nation

Course description: It's personal. It's public. It's a national/global crisis. This series explores obesity: the impact on the individual and national health, especially our younger generation; what research says about achieving and maintaining healthy weights; challenges to slow, stop, and reverse this trend; and opportunities to be part of the solution.

Instructor's background: Elaine Bowen is a WVU Extension Specialist for Health Promotion and is the Director of Outreach with WVU's National Center of Excellence in Women's Health. Interests include women's wellness, heart health, and youth obesity. Her academic background includes degrees in Home Economics Education, Family Resources, and Educational Leadership.


07. A Geologist Looks at Antietam, Gettysburg, and Harper's Ferry Battlefields during the Civil War

Instructor: Robert Behling

Monday, 1:00 p.m. - 2:50 p.m. January 14, 28, February 4, 11 Classroom B

Course description: Battles during the Civil War required logistics to bring combatants, ammunition, and supporting supplies together. This necessitated a linkage of pre-war agriculture, roads, rivers and railroads. The Great Valley, 500,000,000 years in the making, was thus a prime location for a geologists' view on "take and hold the high ground!"

Instructor's background: Bob Behling has taught Geology at WVU since 1971, and has led countless field trips to these areas. Bob has a PhD in Geology from the Ohio State University. His mantra is "It's a Great Day for a Field Trip" and he has led trips throughout North America and has several trips to Antarctica for field work to his credit.



08. Pysanky or Ukrainian Egg Dyeing

Instructor: Elaine Burrell

Monday: 1:00 p.m. - 3:30 p.m. Morgantown Art Association Gallery January 14, 28, February 4, 11, 18

Maximum enrollment: 8

Materials fee: \$20

Course description: This is a fun hands-on course. It consists of alternately drawing designs on the eggs with a wax pen to resist the dye and then dipping them into dyes. Finally, after the wax is removed, participants will varnish the egg to preserve it for many years. Don't let the drawing part worry you the instructor will help.

Instructor's background: Elaine Burrell is a noted, local fiber artist who weaves, dyes, and tats. She has developed a secondary interest in the Russian art of dyeing Easter eggs, called Pysanky. Her interest was initiated at the John C. Campbell Folk Arts School in western North Carolina, and she has taught several courses in this art form since then.

09. Medical Care at the End of Life: How to Receive Only the Treatment You Want

Instructor: Alvin H. Moss

Maximum enrollment: 30

Course description: Over half of West Virginians die receiving treatment they do not want. Advance directives, Physician Orders for Scope of Treatment (POST) forms, and the new West Virginia e-Directive Registry allow patients to retain control of their end-of-life care. Alvin Moss will describe how participants can receive the treatment they want.

Instructor's background: Alvin Moss is a Professor at the WVU School of Medicine and the Director of the WVU Center for Health Ethics and Law and the West Virginia Center for End-of-Life Care. He directs the Palliative Care Consultation Service at WVU Hospitals.

10. Beginning Computer

Instructor: Todd Merrifield

Course description: This course is oriented towards the basics of using a Windows OS computer. This class starts from the ground up. If you are an intermediate or advanced user, please understand that this course is geared to be fairly slow-moving to allow for hands on experience with BASIC computer topics.

Instructor's background: Todd Merrifield is familiar with a broad variety of computer software and hardware, including web programming, computer operation, software installation/maintenance/usage, networking, databases and computer security. He is a member of the OLLI at WVU Honor Roll.

11. Beginning Internet

Course description: This course will cover internet usage focusing on Internet Explorer. Learning to use the different functions of today's popular internet browsers can greatly improve the online experience. The course will also cover visiting websites, using the various buttons associated with the browser's functions, using bookmarks, browser tabs and the browser's history functions. If the time permits, other popular browsers (Firefox, Google Chrome) will be introduced.

14. Chocolate II

Course description: This is a reprise of the original Chocolate course. The class will learn about the history, the making of chocolate, the makers of chocolate, and the taste of chocolates.

Instructor's background: Carole Boyd received her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Michigan before coming to WVU to teach and practice pathology. Her interest in history and other subjects has prompted the several OLLI courses she has taught in recent years.

15. Hamlet as Murder Mystery

Instructor: Byron Nelson

Tuesday, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. January 15, 22, 29, February 5, 12 Classroom B

Course description: A man finds himself trapped in a murder mystery, but when he discovers his father's killer, he finds it difficult to take revenge. Shakespeare's play Hamlet questions the traditional obligation to seek revenge and the nature of human action itself.

Text: Please bring any edition of Hamlet.

Instructor's background: Byron Nelson taught English (Shakespeare, Milton, Bible as Literature, etc.) at WVU for 40 years before retiring in 2011. He previously taught two courses on Broadway musicals for OLLI.

16. 2012 Elections: Retrospective and Analysis

Instructor: Kenneth C. Martis

Tuesday, 1:00 p.m. - 2:50 p.m. January 29 Classroom A

Course description: The November 2012 West Virginia and national elections will be discussed and analyzed with respect to both historical trends and future impact. State and national elections will be compared to the results in 2000, 2004, and 2008 based upon the instructor's book The Historical Atlas of US Presidential Elections. In addition, state exit polling data will be used to help understand the final results. Opinions and observations will be encouraged from class members in a final roundtable discussion.

Instructor's background: Kenneth Martis taught geography at WVU for 37 years. He is the author or co-author of six award winning books on the United States Congress, American politics and presidential elections. He was the first Benedum Distinguished Scholar. 17. Theatre History, Part One: The Greeks

Course description: Responding to requests, Jim Held begins a multi-part series on the history of the theatre. In each section, he will show at least two filmed productions of plays from the period with plenty of discussion time. For the Greeks, our plays will be Medea and Oedipus Rex in outstanding performances by Zoe Caldwell and Douglas Campbell.

Instructor's background: Jim Held is in his final semester of teaching at WVU after 33 years in the School of Theatre & Dance. 22. It's Not Junk! The Outcomes and Impact of the Human Genome Project and ENCODE

Tuesday, 6:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. January 15, 22 Classroom A

Course description: While all cells of a person contain the same genetic information, they must use

that information differently to produce diverse cell types such as liver or heart. In the decade since the Human Genome Project was completed, scientists have turned their efforts away from the "what" of the genome and toward the "when, where, and how." The recent announcement of the ENCODE project will be discussed as it relates to cellular mechanisms that regulate when and where genetic information is used.

Instructor's background: Dana Huebert Lima is interested in how organisms use their genomes to their fullest advantage. Her research has focused on mechanisms that cells use to determine when and where genes are used to produce specific cell types and to respond to changes in their environment.

23. Willa Cather's *My Antonia:* The Immigrant Experience and the Settling of the Prairies

Instructor: Carolyn Nelson and Barb Howe

Course description: The course will focus on Willa Cather's novel, My Antonia, to examine a fictional woman's immigrant experience in Nebraska. We will look at Cather's own life, her childhood move from Virginia to Nebraska, and the role that experience played in her memory and in her telling the story of Antonia.

Text: Students need to obtain any edition of Cather's novel. Please read Cather's introduction to the novel, NOT the editor's introduction, before the first class.

Instructor's background: Carolyn Nelson taught courses on women writers at WVU and has published on the literature of the British suffrage movement and on New Woman writers. Barb Howe taught American Women's History at WVU and has published articles on the subject.

24. Gilbert and Sullivan, Gilding the Philosophic Pill, XXI

Instructor: John Hall

Wednesday, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. January 16, 23 Classroom B

Course description: The class will discuss Gilbert and Sullivan's 4th opera, H.M.S. Pinafore, or The Lass That Loved a Sailor using a 1982 video from the Canadian Broadcasting Company. There will also be some examples of historic performances and hints to references of political and musical events that were popular in 1878. A trip to the Pittsburgh Savoyards performance of H.M.S. Pinafore is planned for March 10, 2013.

Instructor's background: John Hall served on the Microbiology-Immunology faculty at WVU from 1958-1997 and still volunteers in that department. He has a strong interest in music and literature and is on the OLLI at WVU Honor Roll. This will be his 23^{rd} course for the OLLI program.

25. More Out of Africa

Instructor: Alice Frost with Margot Racin and Janet Kemp

Wednesday, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. January 30, February 6, 13, 20 Classroom B

Course description: The first Out of Africa course showed movies about life in Kenya in the colonial era. All were set in the region known as Happy Valley. Now it will continue with East Africa in the second half of the 20th Century.

Instructor's background: Alice Frost has studied and taught in the Classics disciplines. She has pursued life-long interests in art, ancient history, gardens, historic houses, and travel. Margot Racin is retired after 30 years in the WVU English Department. She has coordinated New Yorker discussions in 12 previous terms at OLLI and is on the OLLI at WVU Honor Roll. Janet Kemp taught in the Department of Humanities at WVU for 25 years.

26. Was the Civil War a Just War?

Instructor: Aaron Sheehan-Dean

Wednesday, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. February 20 Classroom A

Course description: The class will discuss the Civil War as a uniquely American conflict. Participants in the conflict drew on the international law of war to

explain and justify their own policies and criticize those of their enemy. This lecture uses the framework of just law theory to consider fundamental questions: how did each side treat non-combatants; how did they treat prisoners of war; what role did guerrillas and other irregular forces play; what was the relationship between civilian and military authority in each section; and how did the fact that the war was fought between two democracies with largely volunteer forces affect the conflict? The answers to these questions reveal a great deal about the Civil War and about how it fits into the larger pattern of global warfare and democracy in the modern era.

Instructor's background: Aaron Sheehan-Dean is the Eberly Family Professor of Civil War History at WVU. He is the author of Why Confederates Fought: Family and Nation in Civil War Virginia, the Concise Historical Atlas of the U. S. Civil War, and the editor of several books.

27. The Normans

Instructor: Earl Melby

Wednesday, 1:00 - 2:50 p.m. January 16, 23, 30, February 6 Classroom A

Course description: The Norman conquests changed Europe in ways that are still evident today. This course will review the establishment of the Duchy of Normandy with its beginning, starting from the Viking raiders. The Norman conquest of England and subsequent changes in England's government and culture will be reviewed. We will also study in detail

the influence of a separate group of Normans in southern Italy and Sicily which eventually resulted in a unified Italy under the Church of Rome. The course will be enhanced with a video about the Normans and there will be ample time for discussion.

Instructor's background: Earl Melby is an Organic Polymer Chemist who recently retired after working in industry for many years. An additional interest of his is the study of medieval history and the Viking age. This course will be a more complete study of the Normans compared to the one session class that Earl gave in the summer term.

28. The Music of Paul Hindemith

Wednesday, 1:00 p.m. - 2:50 p.m. January 16, 23, 30, February 6, 13, 20 Classroom B




